GLOBAL PEACE INDEX 2025



The Global Peace Index 2025: World officially less safe than your grandfather's post-war hangover

By any reasonable standard, 2025 is not shaping up to be a banner year for global harmony. According to the newly released Global Peace Index, the world is now more precarious than at any time since World War II—a sobering thought, considering the post-war years at least had jazz, the Marshall Plan, and a shared horror of nuclear annihilation to keep things in check.

This year's index, published by the Institute for Economics and Peace, reports a 0.36% decline in global peacefulness over the past year. That marks the 13th consecutive year of global backsliding. In what now feels like a grim tradition, armed conflict, civil unrest, and the weakening of international institutions continue to push humanity away from diplomacy and toward... well, something that smells faintly of tinder and gunpowder.

The Global Peace Index, now in its 19th edition, evaluates 163 countries using indicators such as domestic safety, conflict involvement, and military expenditure. In 2025, 87 countries saw their peace metrics deteriorate, outpacing the 74 that managed an improvement. The data presents a stark tableau: while a few nations manage to exude calm like a yoga instructor on Xanax, the rest are increasingly mired in tension, division, and unprocessed historical trauma.

For the 15th year running, Iceland remains the world's most peaceful nation—because of course it does. With no standing army, minimal crime, and more geothermal spas than political protests, Iceland has turned tranquility into a national export. Trailing close behind are Ireland, New Zealand, Austria, and Switzerland—all places where governments function, institutions are trusted, and "civil unrest" usually refers to a mildly heated town hall meeting.

Ireland's ascent into the top five is especially notable, marking its debut in the elite club once dominated by Scandinavian countries. Portugal and Denmark, though bumped from the top five, remain securely in the top ten, joined by Singapore, Slovenia, and Finland. If peace were a club, the guest list would mostly consist of countries with strong public services, decent healthcare, and very few tanks.

At the other end of the spectrum, the usual suspects remain firmly entrenched. Afghanistan clings to the bottom of the list at 163rd, with Yemen, Syria, South Sudan, and Iraq close behind. Israel plummeted to 155th, ranking only a few places above South Sudan, raising eyebrows even in traditionally sympathetic policy circles. Iran, at 142nd, outperformed nuclear-armed neighbor Pakistan, which sank to 144th, perhaps weighed down by internal conflict, political instability, and the occasional disappearance of journalists.

India nudged up slightly to 115th—hardly cause for a parade, but a modest signal of improvement. Turkey fared worse than either of its South Asian peers, ranking 146th, despite—or perhaps because of—its increasing entanglements abroad and combative political discourse at home.

And then there's the United States, which slid to 128th. Once viewed (at least by itself) as a beacon of order and stability, the U.S. now ranks below countries such as Kenya, South Africa, and Mozambique. The report attributes this decline to factors that would sound absurd if they weren't true: widespread gun violence, political polarization, eroding institutional trust, and a general sense that democracy is experiencing a midlife crisis.

War in Europe, Again

Unsurprisingly, Russia and Ukraine continue to plummet on the index, thanks to the ongoing war that began in 2022 and shows no real signs of abating. Nearly three years into the conflict, both countries remain entrenched in a high-intensity military standoff with grave human costs and broad geopolitical consequences. The conflict has destabilized energy markets, triggered historic levels of displacement, and contributed to the highest level of global conflict in 15 years.

In the report's broader context, the situation in Ukraine is a linchpin—less a regional war than a cascading global crisis affecting supply chains, diplomacy, and migration patterns far beyond Eastern Europe.

In 2020, the Global Peace Index focused heavily on the fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic—an economic and social crisis that exposed political frailty in even the most advanced democracies. Five years later, the themes have darkened further. The 2025 index highlights a resurgence of militarization, fraying diplomatic alliances, and a rising mistrust of international institutions. It warns of a "cascading effect" where economic inequality, mass displacement, and geopolitical brinkmanship fuel regional conflicts that risk spiraling out of control.

If the 20th century was defined by Cold War calculations and nuclear deterrents, the 21st so far appears to be shaped by digital disinformation, fragile states, and the slow decay of multilateralism.

First published in 2007, the Global Peace Index has become the world's leading metric for national peacefulness. It's compiled with data from the Economist Intelligence Unit, United Nations agencies, and a wide network of policy experts and researchers. While its tone is typically analytical, this year's report carries a sharper edge—a recognition, perhaps, that platitudes about "shared security" no longer hold the same weight in a world increasingly at odds with itself.

One hopes the index doesn't become just another annual ritual, like hurricane season or awards for worst airports. Because if the trends of 2025 continue, peace may soon be less of a global ambition and more of a nostalgic artifact—like handwritten letters, or the idea that diplomacy can fix anything at all.
