Candidates Chess

Sindarov outwits Caruana to take sole lead

R.R. Vasudevan

Grand Master Javokhir Sindarov (Uzbekistan) led the star field with a handsome 3.5/4 score in the FIDE Candidates 2026 after the 4th round at the Cap St. Georges Hotel and Resort in Pegeia, Cyprus. World Cup Goa winner Sindarov brought down GM Caruana with a powerful opening preparation and middle game display. Despite the loss former World Championship Challenger GM Fabiano Caruana kept the sole second spot with 2.5 points. Sharing the third place further half a point behind at 2.0 points were GMs Praggnanandhaa Rameshbabu (India), Anish Giri (Netherlands) and Matthias Bluebaum (Germany).

In the women's section, GMs Bibisara Assaubayeva (Kazakhstan) and Anna Muzychuk (Ukraine) led the table with 2.5 points after the fourth round. Among a pack of four, Indian Grand Master Vaishali Rameshbabu stayed half a point behind the leaders at 2.0 points. Women's World Cup winner Divya Deshmukh shared the 7th place with 1.5 points and will be working to turn the tide with reflection and preparation. Both the Indian stars would be looking to land their first win when play resumes after a day of rest.

In the game of the day, 20-year-old Javokhir Sindarov defeated Fabiano Caruana of USA. In the Queen's Gambit Accepted game Sindarov caught Caruana with a home preparation from which

the American couldn't recover. Consuming huge time to find over the board answers Caruana left himself with just 10 minutes at the half-way mark to reach the first time control. An exposed king and acute time pressure took its toll and the Uzbek went on to score a fine win in 36 moves. Back-to-back wins against GMs Praggnanandhaa and Caruana shows the youngest participant in the Candidates 2026 is a serious contender for the title. With a plus three score in his kitty, it will be a stiff task for the rest of the field to match Sindarov, who's sharp, aggressive and fully prepared.

In the second game to conclude positively, Dutch Grandmaster Anish Giri overcame World Cup Goa bronze medallist GM Andrey Esipenko. Executing a rarely played line in the Sicilian Najdorf, Giri managed to provoke white into early aggression. Finding himself into unfamiliar territory Esipenko took undue risks ceding material and compromising defence. Once the attack settled down, it was smooth sailing for the Dutchman who converted the advantage into his first victory after 34 moves. With a comeback win offsetting his first round loss, Giri appears to be moving into a better shape and is likely to come up with more surprises.

India set for stern test against Japan

Pathum, Apr 2:

The Indian U20 women's national team are set to kick off their AFC U20 Women's Asian Cup Thailand 2026 campaign against Japan on Wednesday, as the Young Tigresses end their 20-year wait to play in the tournament.

For India, this is more than just an opening fixture. It is the beginning of a journey that has been carefully constructed over months, across continents, and with a clear identity in mind.

After qualifying for the tournament for the first time in two decades, India are approaching the Asian Cup as a team intent on competing.

Head coach Joakim Alexandersson emphasised both realism and ambition ahead of the opener.

"We are very much aware that we are new to this scene right now with the India team. We know we are facing tough opponents and we have respect for them," said

the Swede.

"But also, we have a mindset that we want to make it through this group and qualify for the World Cup. That would be fantastic for the whole country," he added.

India's preparation for the tournament has been extensive and methodical. From friendly matches in Kazakhstan to a month-long training camp in Sweden, the focus has been on developing a squad capable of handling the demands of elite competition.

"We have been together continuously for three months," Alexandersson said. "Before that, we had friendly games in Kazakhstan. We have been to Sweden for a one-month camp, and we invited Uzbekistan to India as well.

"So the preparation has been good. I think we are ready for this tournament in a good way. Since the qualifiers in Myanmar, we have had some very focused work. We have evolved considerably - techni-

cally, tactically, and also mentally as a group. We are confident that our preparation has put us in the best place possible," Alexandersson explained.

Standing in India's way in the opening match is one of the world's most formidable sides.

Japan, record six-time champions of the U20 Asian Cup, arrive as one of the favourites, with a long-standing reputation for technical excellence and consistency at the youth level. The Young Nadeshiko were also world champions in 2018.

Head coach Akira Ijiri made his side's ambitions clear. "Our goal is clear. We want to break through the group stage and win the World Cup. We will do our best to achieve this goal." For India, the challenge is undeniable. But the approach remains grounded in belief. They understand the level of opposition, and at the same time, recognise the opportunity.

Dasharath, Nagini clinch gold to extend Karnataka's lead

Raipur, Apr 2:

Race walker Dasharath Talwar and middle-distance runner Nagini added two gold medals to table toppers Karnataka's tally while Chhattisgarh's Gajendra Thakur bagged a silver medal in the men's 800m and their men's hockey team clinched the bronze on Day 8 of the Khelo India Tribal Games on Wednesday.

Dasharath Talwar led Karnataka's 1-2 in the men's 10km race walk with a time of 45:13.85s with Darshan Bagadi (46:25.90s) finishing second ahead of Gujarat's Sagarbhai Katara (48:16.09s) at the Kreedha Parisar athletics track in Jagdalpur.

Nagini then dominated the women's 800m race to clinch the gold with a time of 2:13.80s to take Karnataka's gold medal tally to 21. Karnataka has also bagged eight silver and seven bronze for an aggregate of 36 medals.

Chhattisgarh's Gajendra Thakur claimed the men's 800m silver medal with a time of 1:53.82s behind Munda, who clocked a time of 1:53.33s.

Thakur was obviously elated with his medal as he had started training for athletics only over a year ago. "I had come for kabaddi trials at SAI Training Centre in Bilaspur but seeing my fitness the coaches advised me to go for track events and I am happy to get my first national level medal at home in the Khelo India Tribal Games," he told SAI Media.

Earlier, Chhattisgarh's men's hockey team clinched the bronze medal by beating neighbouring Madhya Pradesh 14-6. The two medals took their tally to

two gold, eight silver and five bronze medals and they are placed 10th in the overall standings.

With just one day of track and field competitions left, second-placed Odisha continued to chase the table toppers with four gold medals on Wednesday to take their overall tally to 17 gold, 10 silver and 16 bronze medals.

Davanidhi Munda (men's 800m), Roshan Khadia (men's 400m hurdles), Dipa Kisan (women's High Jump) and Dhanmati Xess (women's javelin throw) clinched gold medals for Odisha on a day when Jharkhand also boosted their third position in the medal's tally with two gold in women's 400m hurdles and 10km race walk.

Jharkhand now have a total of 19 medals including nine gold, three silver and seven bronze medals.

In football, Chhattisgarh defeated Arunachal Pradesh 3-2 to book their final spot against West Bengal.

Captain Akhilesh Kumar Uikey led from the front scoring a brace for the hosts in the 34th and 66th minutes with Manoj Kumar Lekam striking another goal in the 75th minute. Arunachal Pradesh were late bloomers and couldn't catch up with the hosts as Rahul Goju Singh brought them close to victory, scoring a double in the 81st and 86th minutes.

In the other semifinal, West Bengal trumped Goa 5-2 with Saurav Sabbar (27th minute), Dilip Oraon (36'), Bijay Murmu (42'), Rahul Murmu (45 1') and Chaku Mandi (90 2') finding the net at least once.

Vishvanath, Sachin advance in Asian Boxing

New Delhi, Apr 2:

India's Vishvanath Suresh and Sachin delivered strong performances on Day 3 of the Asian Boxing Championships 2026 in Ulaanbaatar on Wednesday, registering victories in their respective bouts to progress to the next round.

Competing in the men's 50kg division, Vishvanath Suresh displayed impressive technical skill and ring awareness to dominate Kyrgyzstan's Bekzat Ergoshev. The Indian boxer controlled the bout throughout and secured a convincing 5-0 unanimous decision from the judges.

Suresh will now face a tough challenge in the next round against Kazakhstan's Sanzhar Tashkenbay, the reigning world champion and a World Cup winner in 2025.

In the men's 60kg category, Sachin produced a composed performance against Mongolia's Buyandalai Bayarkhuu.

In a closely contested bout, the Indian boxer remained calm under pressure and executed his strategy effectively to claim a 4-1 split decision victory. He will next take on Chinese Taipei's Cheng-Wei Lee.



When Speakers Stop Speaking..!

The other day I attended a talk where the speaker, a very famous author, talked.

Mind you, not 'spoke'. Talked.

Words flew out of his aged mouth from a voice that was powerful and resonant. Unfortunately, it was not a speech.

Now a speech has a beginning. It has an end. And more importantly it has a purpose. The purpose being to bring clarity on a subject into the minds of listeners. This had none of that. It was like boarding a train that never stops at any station. You get in with hope, but after a while you realise you are simply moving without arriving. And realise, the train is in a shunting yard.

The audience sits there with polite smiles. The kind you reserve for weddings where you do not know the bride or the groom but are determined to eat well. Heads nod. Not in agreement, but in endurance. And every now and then there is applause. Not because a point has been made, but because people are praying it might signal the end.

But even as I write this, I realise something. This is what happens when a speaker stops speaking. The microphone is active. The speaking has stopped. Why? Because speaking is not about words. It is about direction. It is about taking the listener somewhere.

Quite often, this happens when a speaker begins to believe his presence is enough.

That people have come to see him, to be photographed with him, not to listen to what he has to say.

At other times it is fatigue. The unwillingness to prepare different speeches for different occasions, different times, and different audiences. After all, when you have spoken a thousand times, you feel you can simply open your mouth and let experience do the rest.

But why blame only such speakers. What if the fault is also ours?

Because sadly, we listeners no longer have a discerning mind to see the difference between a speech and mere words. We nod,

we clap, we agree, without ever asking ourselves whether anything meaningful has been said.

Sadly, we have forgotten how to analyse.

If a speaker sounds impressive, we are impressed. If he speaks long enough, we assume he must have said something important. And because we do not question, we encourage mediocrity.

Tell me, why should a speaker work hard to prepare a clear speech when random words will fetch the same applause?

It becomes a comfortable arrangement. The speaker talks without direction. The listener listens without discrimination. And both leave satisfied.

But nothing has really happened.

The day we rediscover the power to think, to question, to distinguish between clarity and clutter, we will change the quality of what we hear.

Because good speakers are shaped by discerning listeners.

And when listeners stop thinking, speakers stop speaking..!

Manav, Sreeja bow out of ITTF World Cup

Macao, Apr 2:

India's campaign in the ITTF World Cup 2026 ended on Wednesday after both Manav Thakkar and Sreeja Akula lost their respective table tennis matches here. Manav, 39th in the men's singles rankings, lost 3-1 (11-5, 3-11, 11-7, 11-5) against Olympic silver medalist and world No. 2 Truls Moregardh of Sweden.

After dropping the opening game, Manav dominated the second and stayed locked at 6-1 in the third before Truls Moregardh edged ahead to regain control. The fourth game began on even terms at 4-4.

However, Truls Moregardh swiftly shifted gears, notching four consecutive points to open up a decisive cushion and seal the contest according to Olympics.com.

Manav had also lost his opening match in the tournament against the

Republic of Korea's Park

Gang-hyeon on Monday.

Later in the day, Sreeja Akula also exited the ITTF World Cup after losing her second match of the tournament 3-0 (11-8, 11-7, 11-3) against world No. 2 and Olympic gold medalist Wang Manyu of the People's Republic of China.

Like Manav, Sreeja, 44th in the women's rankings, had also lost her first match in the tournament against Olympian Fu Yu of Portugal.

Only the top 16 group

toppers qualify for the

round of 16 stage.

Olympian and world No. 47 Manika Batra was the only Indian to win a match at the Table Tennis World Cup after beating Lily Zhang of the USA in her second clash.

Batra had lost her tournament opener against world No. 5 Miwa Harimoto of Japan. Miwa

Harimoto then beat Lily Zhang 3-0 in the final group match to progress to the knockouts.

No Indian table tennis player has ever won a medal at the ITTF World Cup. Manika Batra and Sreeja Akula also competed in the 2025 edition of the tournament but failed to make it past the group stage.
